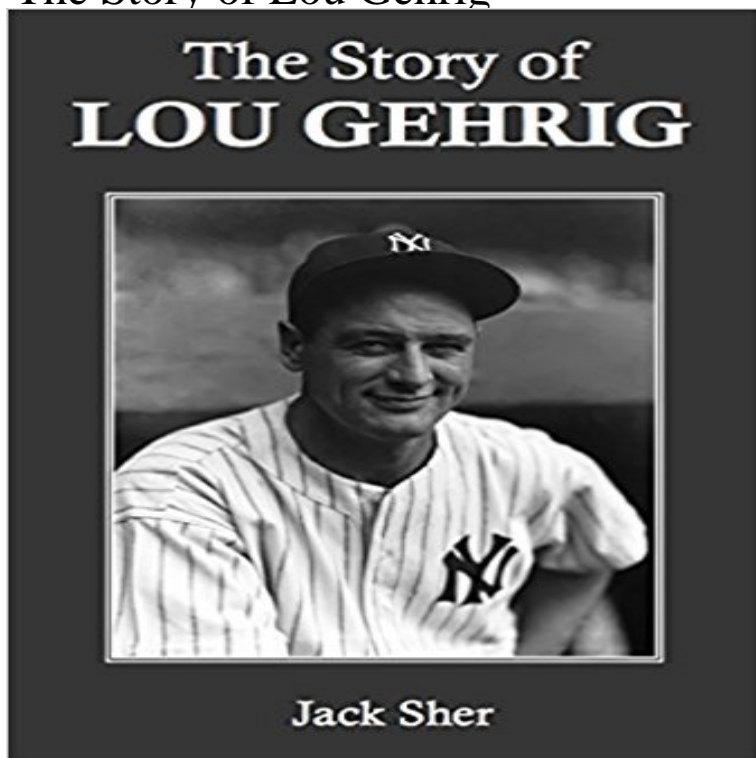


The Story of Lou Gehrig
